Two Reports on Monthly Nevada Gaming Revenues

The Center released the [Nevada Gaming Statistics: August Comparison](#), which examines revenue trends for Statewide, Las Vegas Strip, Downtown Las Vegas, Boulder Strip, and Washoe County for the month of February for the past eight years. In addition, the [Nevada Gaming Statistics: The Last Six Months](#) summary was updated with current information.

New Report: Connecticut Tribal Casinos

Connecticut's two tribal government casinos, Foxwoods and Mohegan Sun, operating Class III gaming under tribal/state compacts, contribute 25% of their gross slot revenue to the state's general fund. As such, monthly results for the two casinos' slots are regularly released, and can be tracked. This report provides insights into the broader Northeastern United States slot market as well as the financial performance of the two casinos themselves.

New Report: Pennsylvania Casino Data

Since its debut in 2006, Pennsylvania's casino industry has been one of the fastest-growing in the United States. This report collects data charting the industry's revenues, machine counts, promotional play totals, and table counts, with win per unit averages for slots and banked table games, and includes tables detailing total revenues, revenue by region, and annuals totals in several categories.
